Upcoming LCUUF Sunday Services

November 8 - "A Copernican Revolution- Spiritual Style"; Rev. Ernie Mills This meditation focuses on our Unitarian Universalist First Principle: "the inherent worth and dignity of every person" and how that principle directly challenges an age old dogma known as Original Sin. Our first principle not only challenges that dogma but represents a radical revolution in how we are to relate to ourselves and each other. Like peace, worth and dignity have to begin with the individual, with you and me. It is, indeed a spiritual revolution no less important that the Copernican revolution that changed our view of the outer universe.

November 15 - "Declaration of Inter-dependence"; Rev. Ernie Mills

As our First Principle challenges an age old dogma known as Original Sin, our Seventh principle, "respect for the interdependent web of existence of which we are a part", challenges another age old belief in humans as the apex of creation, free standing and independent. This Principle reminds us that we "did not weave the web of life, we are merely a strand in it" (Chief Seattle). This Principle expands our vision beyond the human, cultural world to include all of life as well as our interdependence on that life.

November 22 - "Jesus Potter Harry Christ - A Fascinating Comparison"; Speaker: Jan Manning; Service Leader: Sue Boyzchuk

Based on a book by Derek Murphy, Jan will talk about the many similarities between ancient mythology and Christian Biblical mythology. She will use as an example the comparison between the Greek god Dionysus and Jesus Christ.

Ernie completed a BA in Philosophy from the University of North Carolina at Asheville, a Master of Religious Education from Duke Divinity School, and a Master of Divinity from the Candler School of Theology at Emory University. He began his ministry in the United Methodist Church, serving as director of education, assistant pastor, minister and chaplain.

Leaving his long-time affiliation with United Methodism was, as Mills has said, one of the most difficult decisions of his life. But in 2002 he resigned his position at Brevard College and became part-time minister to a small congregation of Unitarian Universalists in North Carolina known as UUTC. "The UUs I have met are dedicated, eager to grow and learn, and are always ready for a new experience" writes Ernie.

When he retired last June, UUTC had a growing children's program, adult education programs, and many new UUTC members and friends.

Ernie credits his family -- wife Diane, and daughters Sarah, Joanne, and Libby -- for keeping him grounded and helping him formulate sermon ideas. Ernie's strong interest in depth psychology and his love of folk guitar and mountain storytelling enhanced his theology and brought an added dimension to his ministry. As lead singer and guitarist for the Eclectics, Ernie performed regularly for the congregation.

Member Spotlight



Susan R. Kelley was born on a Thursday in Iowa, but moved with her family to Muskogee, Oklahoma when she was 10. Even as a child, Sue knew she wanted to work with books, and got her first job in a library at age 15. Sue majored in English at Oklahoma State University where she met Kelley. Shortly after they married in 1959, Kelley was drafted. They were sent to France where they experienced many memorable moments. Following their return to Tulsa, they were assigned to Houston, Texas to await a transfer to Libya, a virtually unknown destination in 1965.

Sue and Kelley lived and worked in Libya for 6 years. Sue has recently completed a book about their experiences, titled "*How the Camel Ate My Hat*", which is based on letters she wrote to her mother.

The thing that surprised me most about Sue was that she worked as a lobbyist for three years with Common Cause, a nonpartisan, grassroots organization dedicated to restoring the core values of American democracy. To this day, she retains her passion for politics, along with books, children, cooking and sports. She listened to Cubs baseball games with her grandmother, and remains a Cub fan.

Sue and Kelly have been Unitarian Universalists for 15 years and were founding members of LCUUF. Sue served on the original steering committee and was a member of the Sunday Service Committee for 6 years. She set up and continues to manage the Fellowship Library and currently serves on the Care Committee. Sue and Kelley have lived in Mexico for ten years. *Jan Manning*
