LCUUF Celebrates 10 years!

Early in 2006, Barbara Lauer and Trudy Crippen called a meeting at Melanie's Restaurant to discuss forming a Unitarian Universalist Fellowship. Snowbirds Fred and Mardele Harland and 2 others showed up. We decided to start holding services and see what happened!

Our first service was held on March 5th, 2006 in donated space provided by Melanie's Restaurant in Danza Del Sol. Our lay-led services attracted US and Canadian UU's and other interested individuals, including year-round residents, snowbirds, and vacationers.

With attendance increasing and winter approaching, we moved to our second home at Pedro's Gourmet Restaurant on Ocampo.

The growing fellowship soon required another move. Negotiations with the Lake Chapala Jewish Congregation resulted in a move to their building in May, 2007, where we happily held services until October 2013, when we moved to Sol Y Luna on the west side of Ajijic.

And now we are on the move again. On March 6, 2016 (our 10th Anniversary) we will hold our first Service in Hidalgo #261, which we are sharing with Naked Stage.

In the beginning, most decisions were made by Barbara and Trudy, with support from others. In September 2006, a Steering Committee was formed, chaired by Fred Harland. The committee worked for many months developing our statement of purpose and membership criteria. These were approved at a congregational meeting on March 19th, 2007. Charter Sunday followed in June with 20 people signing the Membership Book.

LCUUF bylaws were approved and elections held a few months later. Our first Board consisted of President, Steve Barr; Vice-President, Trudy Crippen; Treasurer, Bob McKeown; Secretary, Ana Ellsworth; and Members—at-Large, Susan Barr, Paul Bennett and Lew Crippen.

Much of the on-going work of the Fellowship is carried out through standing committees.

The **Sunday Service** Committee is responsible for planning our services, which have evolved in a number of ways over the years.

Sue Kelley's donation of her mother's piano, and Mardele Harland's playing greatly helped our singing, as did the formation of a choir.



Development of a Sunday Service Manual led to standardized Orders of Service and provided access to a wide range of resources; as did our Library which was started and is still maintained by Sue Kelley. Purchase of a projector has added another dimension to our services. For 10 years we have been a Lay Led Fellowship, with our members taking responsibility for planning and leading services and presenting most talks. A Visiting Minister program, now financially supported by the UUA, has helped us to grow and develop.



El Pilar Fish Farm

Outreach to the Mexican Committee has been part of our Fellowship from the early days, beginning with support to the Villa Infantil Orphanage in 2007. LCUUF financially supported the El Pilar fish farm in Riberas for several years and then began supporting the Hungry Children of Mezcala school feeding program, which members continue to support. At the recent Annual

Meeting, the decision was taken to also support a Women's Health Clinic.

We are an aging congregation of mainly expatriates living far from family. So it is not surprising that **Pastoral Care** has been a major priority for us and continues to be so. We are grateful to those members who have spent countless hours providing various levels of support to members in need. Recently, Pastoral Care Workshops were held, and a comprehensive "Emergency Registry" has been developed and is currently being completed by members.

The **Membership Committee** has responsibility for attracting and retaining LCUUF members. One hundred and eleven (111) people have signed the Membership Book since Charter Sunday in 2007. But not surprisingly, the number of active members is lower – 69 as of our last Annual General Meeting. Several members have moved away, and a few have died or resigned or lost interest for various reasons.

A **Covenant of Good Relations** and a Conflict Resolution Plan were developed and approved at the AGM in 2015 in which "we covenant to treat ourselves and one another with respect".

LCUUF has a number of ongoing **programs**, including a monthly discussion group, men's movie group, writer's group, and many social activities such as Circle Suppers, Potlucks and after Service lunches.



The Fellowship maintains a Directory and communicates with members and friends in a number of ways. We have a WEB site, a Yahoo group and most recently this pilot Newsletter.

LCUUF has survived and thrived over the past 10 years, thanks to the commitment and active involvement of its members and friends. And so we look ahead to the next 10 years with anticipation and confidence!

The LCUUF Choir will be performing a special piece at our Easter Service – the "Benedictus" from the Missa Brevis Pro Serveto, the Unitarian Universalist Mass.

The text for the mass was written by Rev. Fran Dearman, Minister of the Unitarian Congregation of Mississagua, Ontario. Music was composed by Tobin Stokes, former composer- in-residence for the Victoria Symphony. The goal was to craft a written text to serve as the basis for a piece of commissioned music, unashamedly complex, modeled on the Missa Brevis, singable for Unitarian choirs, engaging both a theistic and non-theistic hearer. The translation from the Latin is:

"Speak blessing. Blessed is she whose hands bear loving kindness. Blessed is he who walks in peace. Blessed be. Go your ways."
