The Hungry Children of Mezcala Outreach Program

Tañia Ruiz Martinez is an English teacher who has been running the Hungry Children of Mezcala Food Program for 12 years. The program feeds 27 middle-school children every school day for a cost of about 11 pesos (about 64¢ in US dollars) per day per child.

Almost half of the children live with their grandparents for various reasons. Some of them have parents who are divorced and remarried, have children with their new partners, and do not want to care for children from a previous relationship. Some are orphans. Other children live with their single mothers, some of whom are widows, some of whom have high medical expenses due to cancer, leukemia, kidney disease, or heart disease in the family. All of the children have one thing in common. Their families do not have enough money to feed them three times a day.

Tañia has this to say about our contributions, "You are doing a lot for these kids. You are angels. Every day you give them a miracle because you are feeding them and they feel important to someone. They do not feel alone."

LCUUF contributes \$2700 MX to the food program every month. As of April 30, we have \$9,585MX in the food program fund. This amount will take us through May, June, July, and half of August, which are among LCUUF's traditionally low attendance months. Your donations of money or food are sincerely appreciated. If you are interested in contributing food/goods instead of money, look for next month's newsletter where we will print a list of food and other supplies that the program needs as well as how our donations are helping the Women's Health Clinic.

From the very beginning it grabs you, tears at your heart, and makes you feel you are right there with Jack, experiencing the horror, and also the hope.

Written in the first person, Jack tells of growing up as a Jewish boy in The Netherlands in the 1930's, and of how his life was changed forever by the Nazi invasion. Separated from his parents and younger brother, he was forced into hiding because of his "Jewish appearance." At first he was allowed to attend school, but as the danger increased he was moved from one hiding place to another, often in the middle of the night, being saved time and time again by the resistance. Jack tells of his many narrow escapes, and how he remained just "one step ahead" of the Nazis.

The story continues after the liberation of The Netherlands and tells of Jack's first love, his learning the Hebrew language, and his joy when Israel was declared an independent state in 1948. He relates the story of his reunion with his father, uncles and aunt, who survived the Holocaust and his grief that his mother and her entire family, except for one aunt, were completely wiped out. In 1951 Jack and his brother made their first journey to the fledgling state of Israel. The last section of the book relates Jack's life in Israel, living in a kibbutz and serving in the Israeli Army.

This is a must read for history buffs, and also for those who like a well written "thriller." Through it all, Jack's sense of humor prevails and carries him through difficult times to a better life. Don't miss this one! In our Library!
