Upcoming LCUUF Sunday Services

<u>November 4 – Mythology and Spirituality: Origins of Beliefs.</u> Jan Manning will talk about mythology from ancient times to present day beliefs and we will explore our own UU traditions from a spiritual perspective. Susan Miller will be the service leader.

November 11 – The Power of Humility - Humility seems to be a bit out of fashion in the world today. We humans think we know everything worth knowing and can accomplish anything we want, and if we can't it isn't worth doing. We want our children to have strong self-esteem and to develop a self-confidence that will lead to career and life successes. Yet humility, not knowing, not assuming, can lead us to openness to what is new and understanding what we don't know. We will explore how humility as a virtue can be a support to inner peace and a gateway to gratitude. Speaker is Rev. Matt Alspaugh and Lorna Dean will be the service leader. The LCUUF choir will perform.

<u>November 18 – The Path to Wisdom</u> – Acquiring Wisdom as We Grow Older on our Journeys from Ageing to Sageing. We will explore the paths taken to reach elderhood and how we acquire wisdom along the way. This will also be an introduction to the class "Elderhood and Spirituality" which will be offered beginning November 19th. Speaker is Bob Koches, service leader is Kathy Koches.

November 25 – <u>Gratitude Games</u> – We've learned that gratitude is not merely a feeling that come to you, it is a state that you can consciously create and amplify, even share with others. We will explore some practices, rituals, even games for creating greater gratitude in ourselves and our families. We will include a gratitude ritual, a UU Bread Communion, where we will share bread brought from home that is meaningful to us, perhaps part of our heritage or important in our current life. You are encouraged to bring a loaf of your meaningful bread, if possible, made or bought is OK. Speaker is Rev. Matt Alspaugh and the service leader is Liz Moulder.



Message from Rev. Matt

I'm writing this from San Miguel de Allende, where Liz and I have had an enjoyable time exploring the city. and where I had fun leading worship with the UU Fellowship this morning. (Some of them might not like the term 'leading worship'!) In their service, and in previous conversations, it became clear to me that their Social Action program (what we call Outreach) is very important to them. The San Miguel Fellowship spends a significant portion of their income supporting about ten different service organizations in the local area, and their members are directly involved in many more. They are very proud of this. I don't mean to draw comparisons between our two congregations, for we ought to learn from each other, and not compete. But in hearing about San Miguel's Social Action work, I was glad for what we have been doing.

For example, Lew and I visited with the Tepehua Community Center a few weeks ago. This center is the recipient of our Share the Basket funding for September through November. They do remarkable work helping the poorest residents of Chapala with meals, medical care, education, job skills and other programs.

But that's just one of our efforts. We have larger dreams. I'm pleased that one of the outcomes of the recent LCUUF Volunteer Fair, after the service on October 14, was a renewed conversation about our own Outreach work. This conversation continued at, and after, the Board Meeting on October 19. In that discussion, many questions came up (thanks to Joan Ward for summarizing them in this list):

- Why might LCUUF want to do Outreach work?
- What does Outreach do for us, and for those we connect with?
- What different levels of Outreach might we want to pursue?

- Where in the community, and in the world, do we engage in Outreach?
- Who will be involved in these decisions?
 Who will be involved in the efforts?
- How do we carry out our Outreach work?

We will have a meeting on November 15, 2018 11am - 12:30pm, at the Fellowship, to explore these questions. We'll talk about examples of what effective Outreach might look like for us. We'll begin to imagine what a future Outreach Team might do, who might be interested, and how we might proceed. Oh, and we'll also take on one immediate task - choosing our Share the Basket recipient for the next quarter (December through February).

Who should be at the Nov 15 meeting? Will you be there? If you have a passion around Outreach, or even a curiosity, whether you are new to this, or not, I hope you will come.



MEMBER SPOTLIGHT BILL WHITE

I was very interested to learn that Bill was a pilot, something I enjoyed being in my misspent youth. Mind you, the type that Bill flew and the type I flew were vastly different, but as I saw on a mug once: "You ain't nothing if you ain't a pilot".

Bill flew, among others in the Navy, a R4D8, a super DC3 for six years. He joined the Navy during the Korean War to avoid being drafted into the Army and because he already had his pilot's license, he was assigned to ComAirPac, Naval Air. He became the airplane captain for Vice Admiral H.M. Martin, flying once or twice a week between San Diego and Washington, D.C.

He and wife Helen have been married for sixty-four years after meeting on a blind date while he was on leave during his Navy days. They were married seventeen months later. Both say it was a no-brainer decision as both said they found the other very sexy. Two kids came along eventually.

After leaving the Navy, Bill went to college to study business administration and soon he started working at Safeco Insurance Company. He rose through the ranks quickly but after eight years decided to go out on his own and formed "Bill White Insurance" which is still being operated today by son, Bill White III.

During all his "outside" work he owned and operated the family farm in Missouri where, at one time he really got into "intensive grazing" which involved installing many watering places on small five acre sized paddocks through which the cattle rotated daily, therefore always ensuring they ate fresh grass. His only regret is that he didn't know about the program early enough and after ten years had to call a halt to the experiment.

Both Bill and Helen are very sociable people as epitomized by their many travels and friendships throughout the world. They have travelled all through North America and Europe, once getting a Eurail pass and visiting many countries. The Whites also hosted many students from different countries through "American Field Service" and made life-long friends, often visiting them and their families in their home countries.

Bill says one of his most memorable trips was fifteen years ago when he and Helen, the only passengers, spent 54 days on a container ship (see Helen's book 54 Days on a Container Ship) stopping off in California, New Zealand, Australia, San Francisco and Mexico. The crew was mostly from Myanmar, the captain Polish, many officers Ukrainian, and the ship flew under a Liberian flag. They were never bored, as some friends predicted, as there was always something new to see and experience every day.

A life-long love is flying. His first private aircraft was an Aeronca Champion, a tail-dragger with no electrical or no radio. In the 70's Bill bought an experimental aircraft called the Sonerai, which had been built by a professor and students at the University of Wisconsin. The aircraft was designed to be shown at the Experimental Aircraft show in Oshkosh, WI, and was a high performance aircraft not to be flown by inexperienced pilots. Bill belonged to EAA (Experimental Aircraft Association) for many years.

Now retired, and enjoying it very much, Bill spends a lot of time socializing with Helen and attributes his longevity to ancestors who lived to a ripe old age and to a happy life (probably aided by Helen's cooking).

2018 Annual Pledge Commitment

Pledging

LCUUF is conducting its pledge campaign in October and November 2018. We are asking members and friends to pledge the amount you feel you can donate to LCUUF for the upcoming fiscal year of February 1, 2019, to January 31, Pledge cards are available on the 2020. Welcome Table each Sunday. Please fill in the amount of your annual pledge in Mexican pesos, U.S. dollars or Canadian dollars, on the pledge card, put it in an envelope and put it in the offering basket or in the basket for completed pledge cards on the Welcome Table. The pledge campaign will wind up on Sunday, November 25, 2018. This gives our Treasurer, Gary Cleek, time to prepare the LCUUF budget for the Annual General Meeting in January 2019, based on the amount of funds pledged.

Detailed Pledging Instructions on the choices for paying your pledge are on the Welcome Table and on the LCUUF website Giving/Pledge tab http://lakechapalauu.org/pledge/. Briefly, you may put Mexican pesos in an envelope with your name on it and put the envelope in the offering basket after February 1, 2019. You may pay through the website of the First Unitarian Universalist Church of Houston in U.S. dollars from a U.S. bank account or with a U.S. credit

card. You may also pay on the Houston church's website with a Canadian credit card, but you must designate the amount in U.S. dollars. It is important to designate the date of your donation as February 1, 2019, or later, in order to have it count for the correct fiscal year.

Statements of the amount paid on your 2018-19 pledge, as of September 30, 2018, were distributed on Sunday, October 14. Lorna Dean has the statements for those who were not present that Sunday.

This organization is qualified to issue U.S. tax receipts to those who need them. Bequests in Canadian dollars can also be made to this organization.
