## **Upcoming LCUUF Sunday Services**

January 6 – Letting Go – Every gringo here at Lakeside has experienced letting go, letting go of the old home and friends and city. Letting go can be painful, but can also bring opportunity, growth, and new joy in life. Matt Alspaugh will explore his experience with Interplay, a practice of movement and improvisation.

#### **MESSAGE FROM REV. MATT**

As many of you have noticed, we're growing in numbers. Not only is Lakeside feeling more crowded, our Fellowship is too. Often all our chairs are filled, and people are beginning to occupy the Bare Stage theater area (our 'balcony'). We've had to add chairs outside the regular seating area to accommodate everyone. Coffee hour feels full, with lots of energy and bustle.

What steps do we take to make room for new people? This is a profound question. Congregational growth is a paradoxical problem, with an apparently easy, proven solution: if you don't do anything about it, the problem goes away. That is, the people go away, and the congregation shrinks back to a size its members perceive as 'more comfortable.' Making room for people requires effort, perhaps discomfort, change and cost. It's not easy. A simple example: if we add chairs outside the seating area, we will likely need to make changes as to how we do projection and sound so those people can hear and see. That's expensive.

Longer term, we may need to consider building or buying a larger facility of our own. This is an idea that has been proposed, but we've not had formal discussions about the idea. That would be expensive and we might have to change the way we've always done things - from how we produce our Sunday bulletins to how we have our monthly lunch gatherings.

How do we make room for people? It's a question that delves into a deeper aspiration: to share Unitarian Universalism with everyone who is drawn to its values and principles. I hope this is a core intent of our Fellowship, a central part of our sense of mission. I hope we are willing to become uncomfortable, if it means we are welcoming in others who find meaning in Unitarian Universalism, and whose lives will be enriched by being part of us. #### AMAZON SMILE DONATIONS TO LCUUF

Amazon.com will donate 0.5% of any purchase you make to a charitable organization of your choice, providing you use a specific Amazon Smile URL to make your purchase. An Amazon Smile account has been set up for the Lake Chapala Unitarian Universalist Fund, Inc. (LCUUF, Inc.), the new charitable organization incorporated in Texas.

Steps to use Amazon Smile and get credit for LCUUF, Inc.:

1. Go: https://smile.amazon.com/ch/83-

<u>1570707</u> and it will ask if you want your Amazon Smile donations to go to Lake Chapala Unitarian Universalist Fund, Inc.

2. If you agree, it will create a specific URL for your Amazon account. You may have to sign in with your <u>Amazon.com</u> login information, if you are not already signed in.

3. When you use the new URL which has been created for you, it will display "Supporting: Lake Chapala Unitarian Universalist Fund Inc." immediately under the search bar. Then LCUUF, Inc. will be credited with 0.5% of the purchase price each time you make a purchase.

When at least USD 5.00 has accrued in the LCUUF, Inc. account at Amazon Smile, it will be automatically deposited in the LCUUF, Inc. bank account at SunTrust. The program makes a bank deposit every calendar quarter if there are sufficient funds accrued.

This only works with Amazon USA. It does not work with Amazon Mexico or Amazon Canada, because Amazon Smile is set up as a U.S. foundation. It would be helpful if everyone in the congregation, who uses Amazon.com, would try out this process and let Lorna Dean Imdean695@gmail.com know when you have it set up to credit LCUUF, Inc. Also contact Lorna Dean if you have any problems with the process.



## SERVICE PLANNING WORKSHOP

We are using a new way to plan upcoming Sunday services. On **Tuesday, January 22, 9:30 - 11:30 am** a group of us will meet at the Fellowship. First, we will brainstorm ideas for upcoming services. Next we'll have a selection process to choose those topics that both have plenty of interest and have people willing to help out in some way. Finally, we'll organize these selected topics onto our service calendar, identifying Service Leaders and Speakers.

You are invited to participate -- no matter how little or much you'd like to be involved in creating services. You could come just because you've got ideas. You might also want to help out, maybe simply by reading one small piece in a service. Maybe you can read a larger part of the service, or even organize the service (we call these people Service Leaders). Maybe you can prepare a short reflection to be given alongside several other people. Maybe you might write a fulllength (15-20 minute) talk, as the main Speaker for a service. Maybe you could help in other ways we haven't even fully explored - writing poems, displaying art, producing a slide-show, creating rituals, music, dance...

This model is used in other UU congregations. We hope that working together will amplify our wisdom and creativity and also welcome newer voices into helping create services. ## WRITE FOR RIGHTS

Thirty two people stayed after the service on Dec. 9<sup>th</sup> to participate in LCUUF's first "Write for Rights". This is an annual project of Amnesty International which takes place around International Human Rights Day on Dec. 10<sup>th</sup>. LCUUF chose 5 women to support; from Iran, Kyrgyzstan, South Africa, Ukraine and Sudan. All of them have suffered a great deal for speaking out and taking action on human rights issues. They have been harassed, beaten, threatened and even imprisoned. The 30 letters and ten emails written by LCUUF participants will hopefully help to make a difference in their lives. Thank you to all who took the time to learn about these women and to write a letter on their behalf.

**MEMBER SPOTLIGHT - Val Marcum** 

When I asked Val what was the event that most changed her life, she readily answered, "When my husband Marc and I bought a 28 acre campground in the foothills of the Ozarks and built it over the next twenty-four years into 106 acres." Marc had retired at 55 from Blue Cross/Blue Shield and for the next few decades he and Val ran the campground, buying and selling it on almost a whim. By the time they sold, *MarVal* had become the biggest and best known resort in Oklahoma. Val has many, many interesting stories about those years and sadly space doesn't permit me to relate them, but be sure to ask Val.

One of those stories is when they bought large trout from WildLife to hold a fishing tournament, which turned into a wildly successful boost to tourism for Oklahoma and how they had to watch the fish all night to be sure they were in enough water and what fun it was sitting around the campfire laughing and eating cake. Or how they expanded the campground, with bath-houses and a pool. Or their Halloween treat to the community of a spooky ghost and goblin trail through their woods, and hay rides afterwards. Or how she was the designated "enforcer" responsible for subduing rowdy campers or asking them to leave. They all worked every day of the year from 6 AM until 10 PM or later. What she loved most about the campground was the opportunity to work and live with her close and extended family. At one time or another they all contributed to the work. She credits Lynn and Gary, who bought into the enterprise after four years, with being the driving force behind all the improvements that were made on the campground.


Val lived most of her life in Oklahoma and Missouri and moved to Lakeside in 2016 a year after her husband of 65 years, Lyndral Ervine (Marc) Marcum, died. They had four children, Lynn, Larry, Leia, and Lee. As a child she wanted to be a nurse, but married at 18 and eventually went into tourism instead. Her parents taught her to think for herself and she attended a Christian Church as a teenager before settling on UU as her parents had.

Marc and Val met when she was giving a presentation on what she had learned at a UU workshop while in high school. Afterwards they went hiking, which they both loved and that was the proverbial that. Marc was like the Energizer Bunny – he never stopped pursuing Va. Her father, who had opposed the union, and even went so far as to move Val 100 miles away to Grand Junction for her senior year of high school, finally threw up his hands and said "I give up". Val and Marc were married shortly after when she was 18.

Painting has been a life-long love. She remembers in church as a child, drawing pictures of people she could see and still likes doing portraits. She works in watercolor today, but used oils for many years. She is mostly self-taught but did take a few week-long artists' workshops. Before they bought the campground Val had various jobs: selling real estate, teaching accordion, and working as a bank teller, an assistant librarian, and substitute teacher for grade school disabled children.

The modern convenience that Val values most is airconditioning. When growing up in the 30's in OK, it was not unusual for temperatures to reach the 90's or 100's and families moved their beds outside for the six to eight weeks of summer. When they got the campground, Val made sure they had A/C in their house and offices.

The most important thing for Val after the three essentials of food, clothing and shelter is family. Next would be painting and music. By Jan Manning
