Upcoming LCUUF Sunday Services

Aug. 1 – Spotlight Consciousness and Lantern Consciousness - Consciousness narrows as we age. As we know more we see less. This is the transition from lantern to spotlight consciousness. It does not have to be this way, though. We can learn 'Beginner's Mind' and bring a new, more open awareness to our everyday life. Richard Clarke will talk about how to do this. Pam Cucinell will be service leader.

Aug. 8 – Can Cities Save Us? - Right now, about 5% of the earth's land surface is consumed by cities, which are where a little over half of the world's people live. The UN predicts that by 2050, over two-thirds of people will live in cities, that is to say, nearly 7 billion of almost 10 billion total people will live in cities, and they may consume 10% of land area. For many, this is a dystopian scenario, of pollution, traffic, and crime. But the world's people think differently, and are moving from farms to cities. I think the migration of people to cities is a hopeful thing. Cities may be the gateway to a stabilized world population living sustainably in a world alongside nature. We'll explore how this might be possible. Rev. Matt Alspaugh will give the talk and Sue Kelley will be the service leader.

Aug. 15 – Food Scarcity: What Does it Mean and How Two Local Non-Profits are Making a Difference - Food scarcity has been a global problem for generations both globally and locally. This service will examine what it means and how it affects communities globally and more important, locally. Mark Rochon and Robyn Puntch from Foodbank Lakeside and Janine Kirkland and Augustin Vazquez Calvario from Operation Feed will join us to present information about their efforts to address food scarcity and share stories of their successes. Kriss Gang will be the service leader.

Aug. 22 – Opening Our Eyes, Finding Our Vision - Do we have visions for the coming phases of our lives? What do we yearn for, what do we work for? The world has changed a lot in the recent past, maybe it's time to re-examine, even to change our visions. How do we do this? Carl Jung said, "Your vision will become clear only when you look into your heart. Who looks outside, dreams. Who looks inside, awakens." Together we'll explore how we might look within to find our individual and collective visions for the coming days. Rev. Matt Alspaugh will give the talk and Heidi MacLennan will be the service leader.

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Aug. 29 - How we have been incorporated as Individuals? - This service is based on American media theorist, writer, columnist and lecturer Douglas Rushkoff's book "Life Inc." It traces how corporations went from being legal fictions to being the dominant fact of contemporary life. The result, corporatism, has infiltrated all aspects of civics, commerce, and our culture, from the first chartered monopolies to the branding of the self. Today we will explore the impact of corporatism on individuals, personal life decisions influenced by it and how we can move forward and beyond its hold on society. Kriss Gang will be the presenter and Deb Gang will be the service leader.

MESSAGE FROM MATT

Near the end of August, Heidi MacLennan and I will offer a service about vision, about imagining possible futures and acting in a way to bring the best possible futures in existence. Now is a good time to think about vision, as we gradually emerge from the pandemic, from a time when so many things seemed to be on hold. It's a good time to ask, "where am I going with my life?" or "what do I want for my future?" Certainly there's a risk in getting focused on a single outcome, just one goal. If anything, the pandemic humbled many of us who thought we had things figured out. Still, just as some doors have closed, other doors open. But we have to have the wisdom, more precisely the vision, to know which door to walk through. Heidi and I hope to explore these themes with you on 22nd August.

Like many other organizations, LCUUF had let our website become fallow during the pandemic. After all, we weren't having in-person services or activities, and people weren't moving here during the pandemic.

We have begun updating the website, with the help of one of our newer members, Frederico (Howard) Frederick. His background as a business-school professor caused him to ask deeper questions like, "who is our audience?" and "what are we about?"

This has caused me to begin to think about these same questions, plus "who do we want to become?" This is the question of vision. It's often phrased something like "what do we want to look like, 5 years from now?"

At our July board meeting we talked, just a little, about that question. We certainly wanted to be more welcoming to LGBTQ folks. We wondered about attracting more Mexicans who might be interested in UU. We realized that having a children's religious education program is probably unlikely. And this was just informal discussion!

Assuming we are able to work together to describe who we want to become, we will have to act. For example, we might be more active in LGBTQ programs and concerns, and find ways to provide Spanish language support in our services.

There is a Japanese proverb that goes, "Vision without action is a daydream. Action without vision is a nightmare." And so, unless we want to merely daydream, or worse, live a nightmare, let's begin to think about our visions, our own and for the fellowship, and then put them into action.

Now that we are having in person services again, any loose pesos in the offering basket on Sunday will be split: 1/2 to the LCUUF general fund, and 1/2 to the Share the Basket recipient for the month.

If you pay your pledge or make a donation to LCUUF by PayPal, by Bill Pay, or pesos directly to Lorna Dean or David Hudnall, you may specify the amount that you want to donate to the Share the Basket program.

Our policy for Share the Basket, during the coronavirus crisis, has been: If we collect more than MXN 5,000 pesos in any month, the full amount will go to an organization providing food to the Lakeside community. If we collect less that MXN 5,000 pesos in donations in any month, the balance will be subsidized from the LCUUF treasury, as long as this is financially feasible. However, as you can see above, we have received over MXN 5,000 pesos for each month so far this year.

Poco a Poco/Brigada Estatal in San Pedro Itzicän https://www.pocoapocosanpedro.com is our recipient for Share the Basket donations in August 2021. Poco a Poco volunteers work alongside and in very close cooperation with the Brigada Program.

They sponsor a community kitchen for children and provide dispensas (bags of basic groceries) to renal patient families, in addition to other self-help programs.

The Tech Team has been working to install our new pan/tilt/zoom camera and got it done today. This is one of the final things to be incorporated into the video for the fellowship. Over the past few months, we have been working to eliminate problems that plagued our early efforts to bring you a Sunday service. Fortunately we have succeeded eliminating most of our problems and are now working on the smaller and less noticeable type of problems. As people have commented, our services have been getting more and more flawless. We hope to continue this excellence in our services. We have two tech teams that alternate every week. We are looking for volunteers to expand our tech team to the point of having three trained teams, with each team working once every three weeks. That way we would have enough team members so that if someone was sick the congregation would not notice a difference. More Service Leaders are also needed. We have also begun an intensive training program to teach each team member all of the jobs in the Tech Team. We want each members of the team to be able to assume any job and do it well. With our experience and getting our equipment installed and operating properly, we should be able to continue our efforts at bringing you an excellent Sunday Service each

week. Our team members are dedicated to doing the best job of which they are capable. Roy Haynes is to be especially congratulated on the job that he does each week with the slides used in the services. David Hudnall and Kriss Gang are our video switcher operators, and do a superb job. Dave Miller and Charlie Jacobs control the sound for the services each week. Richard Clarke is standing in for Kriss Gang as a video switcher operator. Richard's usual job is working from his home and switching external speakers into the video and audio stream so that it appears seamless. His other job is editing the service and putting it on You Tube for all to see. Roy Haynes and Robert Barnett control the Power Point slide show and videos. We have various people writing the scripts for the services. The presenter usually writes his or her presentation. The Service Leader script is written by Rev. Matt or Richard Clarke. The Sunday Service Committee is intimately involved with the services. There is a service coordinator who is in charge of all services during their term of service. Each service must be approved by the committee. Ideas for services come from the committee or Rev. Matt or from the presenter. The service is the result of a lot of work by a diverse group of people.
