Upcoming LCUUF Sunday Services

Jan. 2nd – Welcome to this Place of Possibility –One of my Unitarian Universalist ministerial colleagues has said, "I often like to think of us as the religion of 'Why not?!" At our theological core is a sense of openness, of making space for possibility. We have an expansive religion, easily able to hold many ideas, beliefs, values, at once, all as possible. As we close out one year, and begin another, it's a good time to reflect on what's possible for us. Rev. Matt Alspaugh will give the sermon and Dee Dee Camhi is the Service Leader.

Jan. 9th – **UU History** – Trudy Crippen and Catherine Luria will present a history of Unitarian Universalism. The service leader is Kathleen Pharis.

Jan. 16th – **Finding UU** –Long time LCUUF member Carol Powell will tell of her journey from being a Catholic nun to becoming a Unitarian Universalist. The service leader is Lorna Dean.

Jan. 23rd – State of the Congregation – As this is the service just prior to our Annual General Meeting, let's take time to reflect on what we've accomplished in the last year, and in the years before that. We'll also consider what the future might hold, what big questions we might face, and how we might begin to explore, if not answer, them. Rev. Matt Alspaugh will give the sermon and the service leader is Lynn Cleek.

Jan. 30th – Embracing the Other –The last few years have brought a deepening of The Othering of America; Republicans vs Democrats, pro-vaccination vs anti-vaccination, Woke vs non-woke. Is this dynamic working for us? What now? Tim Schubert will give the talk and the service leader is Eric Luria.

In-Person Fellowship Attendance Requirements

The LCUUF Board decided at their September meeting to amend the current, in-person attendance requirements. We will now require that all attendees be vaccinated for Covid. No one will be required to show proof of vaccination. You may be vaccinated anywhere, with any vaccine. This change will be effective beginning with the first service in October. Masking and social distancing will still be required for attendees in addition to Covid vaccinations.

This change is being implemented in an effort to be responsive to the congregation and to encourage in-person attendance. The Board will review this new policy after we have had some experience with this change. We will carefully consider feedback from those attending and those not attending. Of course we will also review any change in the number of attendees. So that you are aware, the Board was split in coming to this decision, so it is especially important to let us know your feelings about, and experiences with, this new policy.



We are also meeting on-line, at our usual time, Sundays at 10:30, using a service called Zoom. Here's how to get set up. We suggest you do this before the meeting.

MESSAGE FROM MATT

As I write this, the winter solstice has just passed, and we enter into a time of gradually increasing daytime. My body begins to notice this in early January, when my spirits begin to pick up. Even in Mexico, with relatively little seasonal daylight variation, I notice. This is also the time of transition from one year to another, and for many of us, time to reflect on the past year and plans for the coming year. Let me just note that I'm extremely pleased with what we've been able to do this last year, as challenging as that year has been. Our Sunday Services are broadly accessible online and in person, and our small group programs are accessible as well. Our recent pledge drive was phenomenally successful - which indicates to me that people in our fellowship trust their leadership to use their money wisely to accomplish important work. I'm grateful for that trust and support.

As we look to the future, there are certainly short term questions we need to consider - chief among them, How do we continue to navigate this pandemic? (Or an ongoing endemic - see my column last month). But more important, and harder to frame, are questions about the longer term future.

One way we as a congregation can think and talk about our future is through Open Questions. These are sometimes known as adaptive questions or 'frame-bending' questions. These are not about setting annual goals, but about thinking of the big, strategic, long-term questions about who we are and what we do. I don't get to frame these questions, nor answer them - they belong to the congregation, and it's the role of the board (if it chooses to) to pose and explore these questions.

However, my own version of such Open Questions swirl around in my mind, and this is a good time to share them, if only to get you thinking about such things. The central question is "Who are we?" What makes this congregation different from other UU congregations, primarily those in the USA and Canada? How is our membership different from that of congregations in the north? What do we want to become? We are largely comprised of migrants from the north, but perhaps we might like to become more diverse.

Another question is "How do we relate to our neighbors?" How do we work with other religious and social service organizations in the Lakeside area? What do we hope to accomplish, together?

A related question might be "How do we relate to our UU neighbors?" That is to say, what might involvement and support of other UUs in Mexico look like? We know that there are a couple other congregations here, and some informal groups, as well as, surely, individual UUs - and these are comprised of Mexicans and migrants. How might we connect with them? What questions arise for you? Are they variations of these, or other different ones? I'd love to hear your thoughts. I hope to talk more on January 23, at the service before our Annual General Meeting.

UU Pledge Campaign for 2022-2023

The Pledge Campaign for 2022-23 officially ended on December 5, 2021. However, we have received additional pledges since then. As of December 17, 2021, the total pledges for 2022-23 are **MXN 920,100 pesos**. Our goal had been MXN 750,000 pesos, and I am pleased that we exceeded the goal.

Pledges were received from 43 pledge units (a single person or a couple pledging together) representing 67 people. The average pledge was MXN 21,398 pesos. The median pledge was MXN 12,000 pesos.

83% of the pledges were made in U.S. dollars, 3% in Canadian dollars, and 14% in Mexican pesos. All were converted to pesos for the pledge total.

I want to thank everyone for making this pledge campaign the most successful ever, especially the eleven new members who pledged, and the speakers, organized by Fred Koesling, who spoke on "Why I Pledge" each Sunday.

SHARE THE BASKET

Now that we are having in person services again, any loose pesos in the offering basket on Sunday will be split: 1/2 to the LCUUF general fund, and 1/2 to the Share the Basket recipient for the month.

If you pay your pledge or make a donation to LCUUF by PayPal, by Bill Pay, or pesos directly to Lorna Dean or David Hudnall, you may specify the amount that you want to donate to the Share the Basket program.

Our policy for Share the Basket, during the coronavirus crisis, has been: If we collect more than MXN 5,000 pesos in any month, the full amount will go to an organization providing assistance to low-income members of the Lakeside community. If we collect less that MXN 5,000 pesos in donations in any month, the balance will be subsidized from the LCUUF treasury, as long as this is financially feasible. However, we have received over MXN 5,000 pesos for each month so far this year.
