In an hour and a half, Chavurah Chapala and the Unitarian Fellowship take us from Erev Rosh Hashanah to Yom Kippur, using the iconic liturgy and music to help us individually and as a community as we recognize and forgive our shortcomings and, listening to the still small voice within, become at one with ourselves, each other and the universe in order to face whatever the new year brings. #### **MATT'S MESAGE**

I take some satisfaction in noting that I have now been here at Lake Chapala UU Fellowship for just over five years. I remember vividly our three-day drive out from the August heat and humidity of Houston, where we had spent a week with Rev. Daniel O'Connell and the staff at First UU Houston (FUUH), our partner church at that time. We drove down through the dry heat of south Texas, enjoying cooler temperatures in Mexico as we climbed in altitude, finally reaching Ajijic, and our rental house, where our first night's sleep was interrupted by the thunder and lightning of the legendary early morning storms of Lake Chapala.

During my first year, we attempted to build a satellite relationship with FUUH. This was a vision of Rev. Daniel, and we were one of three fellowships working with FUUH. But the FUUH board disagreed on this model, Rev. Daniel left, and we ended the relationship in 2018. That relationship was good for me in that first year; I had peers and resources in Houston, and they could pay me in US dollars. We experimented with recorded video services from FUUH, and while they weren't so successful, that experience helped us when the pandemic hit. During those pre-pandemic years, we grew in attendance, membership, and financial generosity, to the point that we began investigating a larger facility.

Then Covid came. While many UU congregations, and for that matter churches of any type, suffered tremendously during the depths of the pandemic, LCUUF did remarkably well. We learned how to do online services and small group meetings. When it was possible to meet in person, we continued with a hybrid service format, both online and in-person. We continue to improve this hybrid format, because we realize that many of our people remain unable to attend in person due to distance, travel or infirmities.

It does feel that the pandemic is winding down, and we can begin to look toward our future. We will begin again with considerations about our meeting space, planning when we might need a larger space, what we can afford, and whether we might build or buy. I am happy that people are interested in more focused, hands-on social justice work in the communities around us. And my fond dream is that we will be in a good place to work with other UU congregations, small groups that meet, and individual UUs scattered around Mexico, and even Latin America, to promote our faith in these regions. I am optimistic for our future together.





# Introducing Our New Facilities Operations Team
