Nov. 6 – **LESSONS FROM THE CRITTERS** - Rev. Don Beaudreau will be our speaker. Don is a retired UU minister who has lived with his husband Juan at Lakeside for 10 years. They share their home with 7 dogs, 2 cats, a snowy-white lab mouse named "Algodon" ("Cotton"), and with whatever cow, horse, turtle, dove, snake, etc. that passes by their front door. Nov. 13 – **We Won't Be One: Schismogenesis and Human Nature** – One of our favorite hymns speaks to one of our deep desires as Unitarian Universalists.- "We Would be One" Our Lake Chapala congregation holds the idea one oneness as a core theological value. Yet as humans, we like to divide up in to self, in-groups and out-groups, amigo and enimigo (friend and enemy.) Schismogenesis means creation of division and it seems to be built into our human nature. How do we find a way to create unity instead of division? Is that even possible? Rev. Matt Alspaugh will give the talk and Dee Camhi will be the Service Leader.

Nov. 20 – Enjoy the Journey - Susie Wagner, long-time member, will speak to us about aging without getting old. She will give us the benefit of her 86 years of wisdom and experience and challenge us to see ourselves in a new light. The Service Leader will be Kathy Koches.

Nov. 27 – The Only Lasting Truth is Change – The title is a quote from Octavia E. Butler's seminal work, "The Parable of the Sower" This line points to dee; theological wisdom found in many religious traditions, and perhaps more importantly, in the lived experience of many of us. We'll explore how we can befriend, even embrace change in our lives and the world around us. This is also the end of our pledge campaign. We'll celebrate and ponder what changes may be ahead of us at LCUUF in the months and years ahead. Rev. Matt Alspaugh will give the talk.

MATT'S MESAGE

In early October, board president Kriss Gang and I presented a Stewardship service to start our Pledge Campaign. That service unfortunately wasn't recorded, but I wanted to return to some of the thoughts I presented in the service.

This year, we've asked our congregational leaders to think about what they could do, no, rather what dreams they have for the congregation, if we had sufficient money to afford them. They had many ideas. So some of the things we hope to do next year are: have more guest musicians, invite guest ministers to come to Mexico and present to us, develop more opportunities for direct service in the community with our new social action group. And of course there is our physical space and possible need for a new facility. But longer term, I wondered in that talk, whether we might have bolder dreams. I talked of my internship at Unity Church Unitarian in St. Paul, 15 years ago. My internship supervisor, Rob Eller-Issacs, said, "When you dream, dream boldly, in fact dream ten times as bold. That will be about right." Rob had some ten times as bold dreams, and some of those worked out, though they took years, and others didn't come to pass. But I think dreaming big helped create the possibility for lots of dreams, big and small, to emerge, be developed, and be realized by that congregation.

So now I've been here at LCUUF. I've been here five years. I'd like to offer my ten times as bold dreams.

The first is that we develop ways to welcome and invite Mexican nationals into Unitarian Universalism. To me this means understanding and including them. It means letting go of our assumptions. We might realize that many speak English better than we speak Spanish, so our mostly English language activities may not be as big a barrier as we think. I'm also realizing that many Mexicans are secular Catholics at best, and they hold a variety of spiritualties including humanism, agnosticism, and atheism. Finally, I'm now aware how many have lived in the USA or Canada and they understand the migrant lifestyle, and so they are a bit like us.

Second, we are in a unique place to support other UUs in Mexico and Latin America. I dream we support other migrants from the USA, Canada, and Europe mostly, but also Latino UUs. We're in this unique place in part because we've embraced technology, allowing us to reach people far away. This dream still requires a commitment to reach out to distant UUs, to get to know them, perhaps traveling to meet face-to-face. It would also require figuring out how to include them as full members of our fellowship.


Third, I dream that space is not an issue for us. In the years before I came to this fellowship, it had to move a number of times, sometimes with little warning. While our current building has served us very well, we're on the verge of outgrowing it. When we began looking for larger spaces before the pandemic, we realized that there were almost no existing buildings sufficiently large for our future plans. So I anticipate we will need to plan to proceed building our own facility, something big enough, and flexible enough to hold us with our bold dreams, and whatever dreams that arise for us in the future.

But these are just my dreams. The real dreams should come from you all. What ten times as bold dreams might you have for this fellowship? I'd love to hear your ideas.

PLEDGE CAMPAIGN

As of October 25, 2022, LCUUF has received pledges totaling MXN 430,000 pesos for 2023-24, from 23 singles or couples. This is 43% of our goal of MXN 1,000,000 pesos.

Paper pledge forms and envelopes for 2023-24 are available on the Welcome Table on Sundays. They can be completed and put in the offering basket. If you are not attending services in person, you may submit your pledge by email to <u>Treasurer@LakeChapalaUU.org</u> The email should state: "My pledge to LCUUF is ... (amount in U.S. or Canadian dollars or Mexican pesos)... for the fiscal year from February 1, 2023 to January 31, 2024." Be sure that the currency of your pledge is clearly stated and that you state an annual amount.

Pledge amounts are confidential and known only to the treasurer, bookkeeper and the minister. It is not necessary to start paying your 2023-24 pledge until after February 1, 2023, although we can accept prepayments.

PLEDGE PAYMENTS FOR 2022-23: For the current fiscal year, LCUUF has received MXN 780,334 pesos of the total pledged amount of MXN 965,800 pesos, or 80.8%, as of Oct. 25, 2022.

ASSETS: As of September 30, 2022, LCUUF's total assets are MXN 3,787,148 pesos. This includes the Actinver account, petty cash, the Truist U.S. account, and Schwab brokerage account.

INCOME & EXPENSES: The Income & Expense Statement, from February 1 to September 30, 2022 (9 months of the fiscal year), shows:

Income	MXN 824,553 pesos
Less Expenses	(<u>MXN 516,347 pesos)</u>

Net Income (surplus) MXN 308,206 pesos

I was born 89 years ago in The Hague, the Netherlands. I went to High School and did my military service there and was working as an outdoor salesman when I was offered a Visa for the USA completely by surprise, which I accepted. I was 23. I married Barbara 2 days before I left and went to Grand Rapids, Michigan and then to Chicago, Illinois where I remained until I was 65. Barbara joined me after five months.

In Chicago I worked in various sales jobs, including that of Medical Rep. for Bristol Myers for 18 years. I earned a BS and an MBA in Marketing on the side, but was not able to put my education into practice. I made several entrepreneurial efforts, including publishing Marketing Abstracts, but none came to fruition. I also spent several years being an Associate Professor in Marketing with IIT, which looked impressive but did not pay very well. I even wrote a 60 page book while there for foreign business people. I have three sons, all successfully employed. When I was 65, I was able to get my Social Security, I sold my home in Oak Park and bought a RV with which we explored parts of Canada and the US, and when winter started to come near, we ventured into Mexico. We did that for three years and got tired of that life and bought our home here in Chapala. My dear, dear and unbelievably brave wife Barbara, who never failed me, passed away in 2018 after a very long struggle with a Meningioma. Today I share my life with Diane, the widow of Sheldon, a Unitarian all his life and my best friend here.



SHARE THE BASKET

During the corona-virus crisis if we collect more than MXN 5,000 pesos in any month, the full amount will go to an organization providing assistance to low-income members of the Lakeside community. If we collect less that MXN 5,000 pesos in donations in any month, the balance will be subsidized from the LCUUF treasury. If you pay your pledge or make a donation to LCUUF by PayPal, by Bill Pay, or pesos directly to Lorna Dean or David Hudnall, you may specify the amount that you want to donate to the Share the Basket program. Operation Feed is our recipient for Share the Basket donations in November, 2022.

Operation Feed is a group of people dedicated to providing food and improving the lives of the very poor and marginalized people of the village of San Juan Cosalá, less than a 10 minute drive from Ajijic. They provide weekly food despensas for those who would go hungry without the aid. Many of the recipients are elderly, disabled, and children who are hungry. Operation Feed also supports new program initiatives to involve the people in developing additional income sources and skills (such as English), thereby offering them a "hand up" and not just a "hand out". Operation Feed's goal is to help these people live productive lives, free from hunger. Finally, although Operation Feed doesn't provide monetary support, they do participation in other initiatives in San Juan Cosalá, such as the Token Store and the music program to help increase the dreams of the people of San Juan Cosalá.



The newly formed Social Action Team will be holding an event on December 3rd from 10:00-11:30 to celebrate the Season of Light, Love, and Peace.
