LCUUF Board Retreat Report

Annually, your board of directors participates in a one day "board retreat." This is the board's opportunity to step back from day-to-day business and reflect on our work during the previous year, what we

accomplished and what we have left to continue working on. It is also the time we set board goals for the current year.

This year we met in the beautiful garden setting of our new location and were aided in our work by an outside facilitator, Stacey Rombough, Professional Life Coach and Group Facilitator. It was a busy day beginning with a self-assessment of our previous year's accomplishments as well as those goals we were unable to achieve. Accomplishments included:

- Working on improving communications between the board and committees/teams.
- Supporting the Social Action Team's work to expand our outreach to other Lakeside Charities and engage more with our existing ones.
- Improving our financial record-keeping and reporting.
- Improving our production technology and hiring of staff to support our tech needs.
- Identifying a Task team to facilitate our unexpected need to find a new meeting space.
- Supporting the task force managing the move to St. Andrews.

Goals we were not able to take on because of the move included leadership development, conducting a congregational survey and promoting/marketing ourselves beyond Lakeside. It was decided that this year we would have a special meeting in August to evaluate how we are doing on this year's goals in order to adjust or calibrate to changing situations or conditions.

After assessing our past goal performance, we continued to discuss ways to improve board/committee communications and interactions, addressed the need to effectively work with and manage our paid staff and all board members were asked to define why they agreed to serve and what they thought the role of a fellowship board was.

We had a valuable conversation about managing our hired staff. It was agreed that we would continue to look for a volunteer to fulfill this role. Ideally someone with personnel

management experience. Until that time Cate Howell has agreed to fulfill this role until a permanent volunteer is identified. Richard Clarke will continue to oversee the technical side of our weekly production. Kriss Gang has agreed to revise the original performance evaluation form to accurately reflect their work and to conduct an annual performance review as they approach their one-year anniversary.

The board also took time to contemplate what our future might look like assuming we stay on a growth trajectory. This included an interesting discussion led by Rev. Alspaugh about "ministry" at the fellowship. How would we manage a ministerial transition without the support network of the UUA? Would we choose to move to a full-time minister, or would we look into hiring an assistant minister to take on specific duties such as pastoral care or social action, or something all together different? It was a good beginning to what will be an ongoing conversation.

The board continued to discuss long term considerations about renting vs owning our space, specifically the ramifications of owning which includes the evaluation of financial resources required to fund a capital campaign, identifying local fundraising expertise and comprehending the long-term financial risk given our aging demographic .

These are the kinds of discussions that are never possible during monthly board meetings and are conducted without the pressure of having to make decisions, but rather allow us to explore strategies, identify obstacles and set goals.

After lunch we reconvened to work on setting goals for the rest of the calendar year. What we came up with included:

- Advertise in the Chapala area, US, and CANADA to UU groups –promoting our presence at St Andrews to the Lakeside community and promoting our existence via Facebook to congregations in the US and Canada.
- Strengthen and continue to develop ongoing relationship between St Andrews, Bare Stage, and LCUUF
- Strengthen connections between new, interested, and current members.
- Evaluate staffing needs do we need an office manager? Between the board, minister, and committees, what could be done by an office admin that would relieve volunteers?
- Promote Legacy giving and explore possible capital fundraising options for a permanent location.
- Conduct a congregational survey.
- · Conduct a review of these goals in August or September

And finally, the board addressed leadership issues and agreed to form a leadership development subcommittee to support the nominating committee by working to identify potential new board members for the nominating committee to review as they prepare their recommendations for Annual General Meetings. Paula Odom agreed to lead the subcommittee and Cate Howell and Kriss Gang agreed to be part of this committee.

Overall, the consensus was that it was a very successful retreat, the facilitation was excellent, and that we have a lot of work to do. *Please note that our board meetings are*


