"Earth Heal Us"



We live in a time of existential despair over climate change and other harms to the earth. We are saddened that so many deny the existence of these harms and even double down on increasing such harms. We can easily get frozen in such despair. How do we avoid allowing such despair lead us into inaction? How do we reclaim that mutual relationship with the earth that our ancestors knew?

A little over two weeks ago, the LCUF board held its annual retreat. Kriss Gang, our board president, summarized many of the activities of that retreat in last week's newsletter. I wanted to highlight and expand upon two key areas. First, we talked of our long-term plans for physical space. I am coming to realize that the question of our physical space may be less about having a space of our own as it is about having long-term security and flexibility in whatever

space that we occupy. This wasn't quite true of our

previous location, where we were permitted to make minimal changes, and where we ultimately lost our lease with modest advance notice. We want more security and flexibility than that. Obviously, owning a building — which we would likely have to be custom-built to our own specifications — would be one way to accomplish these goals. But this may not be the only way: a long-term lease has been suggested as one possibility, and I think we are beginning to explore the possibility of a long-term relationship with St. Andrews. Both of these alternative approaches have their advantages and weaknesses, but the important thing is that we are realizing that we have more options to explore to address these needs.

We also talked about professional ministry and ministerial succession. At some point, I will want to retire, or at least 'dial back' my ministry with LCUUF. However, our congregation is growing, and needs more staff time for ministry, not less. The traditional solution would be for me to resign, and the congregation to search for a new minister who could work maybe 3/4 time or full time. Yet we note that the traditional search process is both expensive and risky, especially as we are asking potential ministers to relocate to a different country. However, our association with Saint Andrews suggests alternatives. I was surprised to learn that they have three part-time professional ministers, only one of whom is Anglican. Additionally they have a couple of trained lay leaders (deacons) providing ministry services. While St. Andrews' model for ministry may not fit LCUUF, it does open up our eyes to alternative possibilities for professional ministry. These are alternatives that we will want to explore in the years ahead.

Retreats for boards and other leadership bodies offer an opportunity to step away from the day-to-day business and consider larger, more strategic questions. I think this particular board retreat did just that, opening us to consider, broadly and deeply, important questions about LCUUF's future.
